The elements, criteria and characteristics of each of The Arc of Tomorrow's components

Outreach in the Community

- Promote public awareness of people with I/DD, their needs, issues and concerns
- Using common brand makes The Arc chapter as the place to go
- Use technology to communicate, engaging all stakeholders with all types of communication tools
- A clearinghouse and information center on disability issues
- Support people with I/DD to participate in civic, cultural, religious & community organizations
- Positioned as the leading resource, showcasing the contributions of PwI/DD in society
- Create a welcoming community & collaborate with culturally focused groups and others

Self-Advocacy

- Encourage/support a Self Advocacy Chapter, open to all people with I/DD & affiliated with Self-Advocates of Indiana.
- Empower people & families and promote/support self- determination & self-advocacy
- Promote/support people with I/DD as leaders, advocates and spokespersons on their issues
- Educate people with I/DD about their rights and provide them the tools and supports
- Develop a network of well-trained, empowered and informed self-advocates
- Increase the number of advocates to support people with I/DD and local self advocate groups

Family Support

- Reaffirm The Arc chapter's relevance & role on behalf of all people with I/DD at all stages of life
- Has a presence/be a resource in all transitions of life
- Reach out to parents, siblings & other family members of infants, children and youth with I/DD
- Actively involve, organize, collaborate, support, and assist parent/family support groups.
- Provide family members with information about their rights and provide them the tools & supports
- Develop a resource network to offer parent to parent mentoring and training
- Provide support for students with an IEP and their families
- Support families not receiving services by sharing stories of families who are engaged and active, building on natural supports on what can be done while waiting for funded services.

Membership

- Expand the number of members
- Increase membership in the community, reaching out to targeted populations
- Has a strong/diversified Board of Directors
- Involve & collaborate with other family and disability groups to become members
- Recruit/involve businesses, professionals, government, and others in The Arc chapter
- Build the capacity of all to engage in advocacy

Participation in State Activities/Partnership/Collaboration

- Attend The Arc of IN's Annual Meeting & other conferences, programs and trainings offered by The Arc
- Recommend members & staff (as appropriate) to serve on the state/national board/committees.
- Partner with others to build a stronger voice and promote collaboration
- Attend The Arc of the US Annual Meetings and, when possible, other programs
- Local chapters with professional management staff participate in ICE-Arc and NCE.
- Participate in collaborative approaches in fundraising that maximizes philanthropic resources

Public Policy Participation

- Promote/support the development of PwI/DD & families as leaders, advocates and spokespersons
- Engage state/federal lawmakers on the public policy issues
- Meet and host forum/discussions with candidates in local, state and federal elections.
- Be the local resource for the media & the public about public policy issues
- Respond to & distribute state and national public policy alerts
- Support self-advocates in exercising their rights to vote and participate in the political process.
- Participate with The Arcs of IN & the US in development of public policy goals and programs
